CHAPTER HISTORY

BEGINNINGS:

Initial steps in the creation of the Iota Nu Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated took place on a cool, calm evening in January 1969 when Brother Charles Alston Sr. met with Brother Newton Rucker for the purpose of developing a plan for the establishment of an Omega Psi Phi chapter in Harford County, Maryland.

These men were both graduates of North Carolina A&T class of 1958 and worked as government employees on what is now known as Aberdeen Proving Ground, MD. Brother Alston worked as a mathematician in the Ballistic Research Laboratory, while Brother Rucker worked as a librarian in the Special Warfare Center on Edgewood Arsenal. Their goal was to establish a unified Omega presence in the area, promote fellowship, and foster a sense of urgency and active engagement with youth in need of positive uplift. They successfully recruited 16 men thoroughly immersed in the true Omega spirit and diligently worked to complete actions necessary for the birth of lota Nu.

The charter application was officially submitted in 1970 with the blessing of Grand Basileus Ellis Corbett I. The application was approved and on the glorious day of January 28, 1970, lota Nu became an official chapter of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. The culmination of the vision of these brothers came into reality on March 14,

1970 at St. John's Episcopal Church in Havre De Grace, MD. On this day Iota Nu's Charter was officially presented by the District Representative Dr. Norman Johnson at 6pm.

Challenges: During the initial establishment of the chapter, many of its initial members were stationed at Aberdeen Proving Ground as military servicemen. This provided challenges as chapter members often were called to serve the country in areas outside of Harford County. In the 80s and 90s the number of new members brought into the chapter did not keep pace with the number of members that left the chapter through relocation or otherwise. As a result of constant military attrition, lota Nu made the decision to become a dormant chapter in 1999. This period of dormancy remained in effect for 4 years.

Re-Activation: In the fall of 2003, there were 22 active fraternity members who initiated efforts to reactivate the chapter. The initial meetings in the fall of 2003 took place in the Edgewood Housing Auditorium. At the initial meeting held in the fall of 2003, Iota Nu officers were elected for the following positions: Brother Walter Eugene Egerton - Basileus , Brother. Alfred Abramson - Vice Basileus , Brother Windsor Jones - Keeper of Records and Seal, and Brother David White - Keeper of Finance. These elections ensured Iota Nu had representation at the 56th District Conference in 2004.

The Iota Nu Chapter's 2016 Achievement Week was very successful and the Brothers look for-ward to continuing to support the Harford County community for years to come!









his Thanksgiving Iota Nu brother Dr. John B. Sampson was not able to join his chapter brothers for their traditional dinner deliveries because he was leading a historic medical education team on a project of his design in Nigeria.

Once every four years anesthesia and critical care physicians from all of Africa's 54 countries assemble in a city for a week-long conference to improve medical care across Africa. This year's conference was hosted by Nigeria and held in Nigeria's capital city of Abuja.

By leveraging his year's of experience, close Nigerian friends and partnership with the Christian non-profit, ProHealth International, Brother Dr. Sampson was able to coordinate a 24 member team of volunteers from across the United States as part of a partnership with the Society of Critical Care Medicine, based in Chicago. The physician team joining Dr. Sampson came from such diverse places as Baltimore, Chicago, Pittsburgh, New York, Seattle, Cleveland and many other localities. In a highly coordinated and synchronized fashion the team taught six distinct critical care related educational courses as part of the All Africa Congress at the National Hospital of Abuja Trauma Center with over 200 doctors and nurses from across Africa attending these courses.

The six courses taught included the following:

1. Fundamental Disaster Management Course

2. Fundamental Critical Care Support Course

3. Pediatric Fundamental Critical Care Support Course

4.Tropical Medicine Fundamental Critical Care Support Course

5.Obstetric Critical Care Support Course

6.Case Studies in Critical Care Medicine using High Fidelity Simulation

This combination of high-level and intense courses had never been taught in combination in the United States and yet was successfully executed with excellent results in West Africa.

The Pro-Health International (http://prohealthimpact.com) organization hosted the visiting medical team for an traditional American style Thanksgiving dinner (with an African flare) at the conclusion of the pro-gram. At Thanksgiving Dinner our African brothers had an opportunity to learn more about the brothers of Omega Psi Phi during an invigorating discussion about our beloved fraternity.

uring the last week of November, 2017 lota Nu Brother Dr. John B. Sampson

leveraged his eight years of working with the Sierra Leone health sector to traveled to Freetown (named by Black Americans) to meet with the Ministry of Health and other health sector leaders to secure valuable training and education partnerships with the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine for the primary purpose of improving the health and survival of the mothers of this beautiful and historic country.

Brother Sampson encourages those interested in understanding more about the post-slave trade connection between African Americans and Sierra Leone to read about Paul Cuffee, AME co-founder Rev. Daniel Coker, the Black Loyalists and the novel "The Book of Negroes".





PERSEVERANCE AND RECOVERY

Perseverance is the mark of a strong people and Dr. John B. Sampson has taken a team of medical educators to this historic country to use medical simulation training to improve the ability of Sierra Leone's

nurses and doctors in the management of their surgical patients.


As a result of working with healthcare leadership in Sierra Leone over the past eight years Brother Dr. Sampson coordinated activities with the Sierra Leone's top health care providers to have the training program coincide with the installation of new and novel anesthesia equipment to 21

hospitals across the country. Once the Sierra Leone training team was established and ready for action Brother Sampson traveled with the team to Sierra Leone's various provinces to mentor them as they trained others using the same medical simulation

equipment that they themselves were trained on. This methodology allowed for healthcare workers to learn critical life-determinant management skills without risking the lives of patients during

their training sessions, trained Sierra Leone nurses as trainers for an intensive anesthesia education program. Although this nation-wide training program was executed during visits in October 2016 and February, 2017 Dr. Sampson was asked to deliver a presentation to at Johns Hopkins University on February 7th, 2018. While the Johns Hopkins crowd expected to hear a dispassionate discussion of statistical jargon during this presentation, Brother Sampson brought them back to the human reality of





setting, and also donated and provided cloth-





JUNETEENTH IS THE OLDEST KNOWN
CELEBRATION COMMEMORATING THE
ENDING OF SLAVERY IN THE UNITED STATES.

Dating back to 1865, it was on June 19th that the Union soldiers, led by Major General Gordon Granger, landed at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended and that the enslaved were now free. Note that this was two and a half years after President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation - which had become official January 1, 1863. The Emancipation Proclamation had little impact on the Texans due to the minimal number of Union troops to enforce the new Executive Order. However, with the surrender of General Lee in April of 1865, and the arrival of General Granger's regiment, the forces were finally strong enough to influence and overcome the resistance.

ADOPT-A-HIGHWAY CLEANUP

HARFORD COUNTY "ADOPT-A-HIGHWAY" & EDGEWOOD PARK CLEANUP INITIATIVE

The "Adopt-A-Highway" is a program that allows volunteer groups to pick-up litter along non-interstate roadways as a community service. As a civic organization we have adopted and maintains two sections of state highway (Highway 40 Pulaski Highway and Route 715 at Aberdeen Proving Ground) four times a year. The Maryland State Highway Administration (SHA) provides the Iota Nu Chapter with five (5) "adopt-a-highway" metal signs with the Fraternity and Chapter's name that has been posted along our designated highway to be cleaned. The Park and Pond trash collected is not accountable; however, the State Highway Trash bags are report-ed and accountable to the State Highway Administration (SHA).

Our first cleanup of the year took place on 20 January 2016, the cleanup was organized and led by Bro. Anthony Dorsey. The cleanup started at 9:00 am at the Edgewood Community Park located in Edgewood, Mary-land where nine members of the chapter cleaned the Community Park and the Community Pond. The Park cleanup consists of a playground, basketball court, outer limits of the housing area, and a 1,000 foot common area to the Park. From there the Brothers moved to the Pond which is located in a different area within the same community and it has a total of a half-a-mile (.5 mile) circumference around the pond that required cleaning. This portion of the cleanup concluded at 11:00 am, at the conclusion of the Community Park and Pond cleanup all the Brothers of the Chapter took photographs with the trash bags that was collected and departed for Highway 40 for the High-way Clean.

The Highway cleanup began at the intersection of Spesutie Road in Aberdeen, MD and continued to the intersection near Walmart and Highway 715 near Aberdeen Proving Ground. This distance encompasses five miles of total walking distance. During this cleanup a total of 12 orange State Highway Administration trash bags was collected and left underneath the Iota Nu Chapter highway sign. At the conclusion of the Highway cleanup all the Brothers of the Chapter took photographs with the trash bags that was collected and departed for home.

On 27 August 2016, the lota Nu Chapter continued in the same pattern for cleanup and conducted its 2nd cleanup of the year with the help of 11 Chapter Members. During this clean up the chapter collected 15

orange State Highway Administration marked trash bags and left them underneath the Iota Nu Chapter highway sign. At the conclusion of the Highway cleanup all the Brothers of the Chapter took photographs with the trash bags that was collected and departed for home.

On 17 September 2016, the lota Nu Chapter continued in the same pattern for cleanup and conducted its 3rd cleanup of the year with the help of eight Chapter Members. During this clean up the chapter collected 15 orange State Highway Administration marked trash bags and left them underneath the lota Nu Chapter highway sign. At the conclusion of the Highway cleanup all the Brothers of the Chapter took photographs with the trash bags that was collected and departed for home.

On 3 December 2016, the lota Nu Chapter continued in the same pattern for cleanup and conducted its 4th and final cleanup of the year with the help of 15 Chapter members. During this clean up the chapter collected 20 orange State Highway Administration marked trash bags and left them underneath the Iota Nu Chapter highway sign. At the conclusion of the Highway cleanup all the Brothers of the Chapter took photographs with the trash bags that was collected and departed for home.

The Iota Nu Chapter utilized over 48 members of the chapter during the four clean up periods. Collecting over 50 SHA marked bags of trash weighing in excess of 1500 pounds. The members of the Iota Nu Chapter has walked over 288 combined miles to fulfill this obligation to the Community. This effort has enabled our State Highways and Community Park to be clean and free of trash and more inviting for the residents

HUMAN TRAFFICKING AWARENESS
